Curriculum Intent

At Poplar Farm School our curriculum is designed to inspire enthusiasm for learning, to ensure achievement and to support pupil well-being and happiness.

Teamwork and responsibility are an essential part of our curriculum and we enable children to take on key roles, becoming involved in the community, through celebration of local traditions, by learning new skills and enabling them to take an active part in events throughout the year.



<u>Topic</u>


During this term we want to get to know each and every child and we know how amazing the children are at nursery rhymes! So for our first term we will be exploring and revisiting lots of our classic nursery rhymes to ensure that all the children feel confident and familiar with this topic. In this term, children will learn about Incy Wincey Spider, Humpty Dumpty and many more family favourites. We are going to be creating our very own humpty dumpty puzzles, so we can put him back together again. Make spiders and develop our fine motor skills as well finding out where wool comes from for Baa Baa Black Sheep. We will



discover different movements and create our own poems and music to go along with out rhymes as well as recount the stories told.

Literacy

Using our theme of Nursery Rhymes, children will explore stories and rhymes. This will be a super stimulus for Poetry, extending



the children's vocabulary and giving them the confidence to create imaginative sentences. Children will use drama to physically retell rhymes including 'Humpty Dumpty,' 'Baa Baa Black Sheep' and 'Five Current Buns'.

Children will respond to poetry and stories, listening to and joining in with repetitive patterns and rhyme. They will create their own shape poems inspired by Bonfire Night and the Season of Autumn.

<u>Maths</u>

Children will continue to develop their knowledge and understanding of the number system, focusing on number recognition, sequencing and patterns. We will be completing a number a week while developing their understanding of addition and subtraction in a variety of contexts, e.g. money, length and time. They will use 2D and 3D shapes to create models and pictures related to our topic. Children will learn to use a wide range of measuring apparatus.



Home learning

- Use your letter sounds to sound out objects around your home e.g. t-a-p = tap and c-a-r = car.
- Don't forget to use the 'tricky word' list in your Reading Record to help you recognise the most commonly used words in the English language.
- Sing along to your favourite song. Can you clap the beat?
- Talk about the different members of your family and look at your family photos.
- What do you celebrate as a family this term? Do you celebrate different festivals with any of your friends/family?
- Play a board game, roll the dice, what number have you rolled? Can you move your counter the correct number of spaces? What number have you landed on now? If you moved one more space what number would you be on? Snakes and Ladders is a great game to recognise numbers.
